
Debora L. Spar is the president of the Lincoln Center, former president of Barnard College, and author of numerous books, including *Wonder Women: Sex, Power, and the Quest for Perfection*. This book explores how American women's lives have—and have not—changed over the past fifty years. Arguing that women have gotten stuck in an endless quest for perfection, Spar calls for a change in gender norms. Her August 2020 release *Work Mate Marry Love* offers an incisive and provocative account of how technology has transformed our intimate lives in the past, and how it will do so again in the future. Spar is a graduate of Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service, and received her doctorate in government from Harvard. She is a member of the Academy of Arts and Sciences and currently serves as a director of Goldman Sachs; a director of Value Retail, LLC; and a trustee of the Wallace Foundation. Prior to coming to Barnard, Spar was the Spangler Family Professor of Business Administration at Harvard Business School. While at Harvard, she taught courses on the politics of international business, comparative capitalism, and economic development. President Spar is married

to Miltos Catomeris, an architect whose specialty is academic, institutional and corporate campuses. They are the parents of three children.


