They are nationally recognized speakers and experts in the areas of sexual violence, Title IX, media framing, women's leadership, social media activism, LGBT support and inclusion, and intersectional activism.

Annie E. Clark is a co-founder of End Rape on Campus and a lead complainant in the Title IX and Clery complaints against the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where she graduated Phi Beta Kappa with a B.A. in Political Science. She has a certificate in business and is a former administrator at the

University of Oregon. She is a contributing writer to the *Huffington Post*, MSNBC, and *The Chronicle Vitae*. After directly working with New York Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, she helped write the Bi-Partisan Campus Safety and Accountability Act. In 2013, she was listed alongside President Barack Obama as one of the most influential forces in higher education, and she is featured in the campus sexual assault documentary *The Hunting Ground*. Andrea Pino is a co-author of *We Believe You: Survivors of Campus Sexual Assault Speak Out*, and co-founder of the national survivor advocacy organization End Rape on Campus. She attended The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill as a first-generation college student, where she majored in Political Science and pursued research on the media framing of sexual violence. Her activism has been featured in the *New York Times*, *Vogue*, CNN, *Good Morning America*, as well as many other media outlets. She has appeared as a guest on *The Melissa Harris-Perry Show* and *Bill Maher*. She is also a contributor to the *Huffington Post*. In 2013, she became the first student featured in *The Chronicle of Higher Education's* Influence List, and was listed on *The Huffington Post's* most influential forces in higher education list. Her work and personal journey are prominently featured in the documentary *The Hunting Ground*, which premiered at the 2015 Sundance Film Festival, and she appeared alongside Lady Gaga and 50 other survivors at the 2016 Academy Awards. 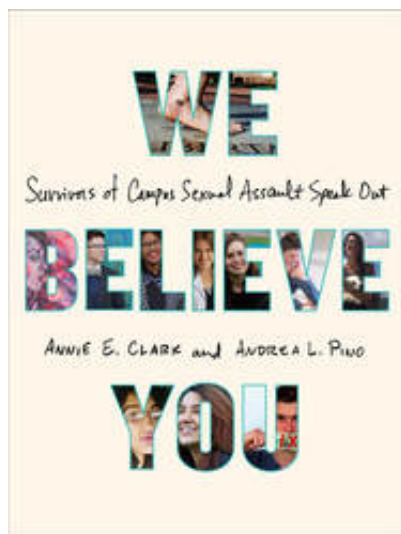
